Risk Assessment and Mitigation

Please join us at Adelphia Restaurant in Deptford on Wednesday, January 21, 2026, for our January Section Meeting. Larry Solow will present “Risk Assessment and Mitigation.”

Abstract: Quality Managers are in the business of making change happen. The people impacted by those changes -- and sometimes the people tasked with implementing them -- can have strong reactions to those changes.

In this interactive conversation, we'll identify those reactions, explore the reasons people have them, and adapt some project management, Lean, and Change Management tools to provide options for dealing with them.

The goals for the session: leave with at least one new "aha" and one new tactic to try when you return to the office.

Speaker: Lawrence (Larry) Solow is an organizational change and effectiveness consultant. He helps both profit and non-profit organizations focus on the people side of change. He blends certifications, concepts and tools from multiple disciplines, including Lean, Project Management, Agile, Complexity Science, and Change Management to address each client's unique situation. He is a skilled presenter, facilitator, and published author.

Past clients include AlliedSignal, ATK, Cigna, Harley-Davidson, Inspira Health Care, Mattel, and USA TODAY.



Logistics Rule the Day


Our February meeting will be a joint meeting with the South Jersey Section of ASQ and will feature Chapter President Kevin Derevik discussing issues with modern logics.
